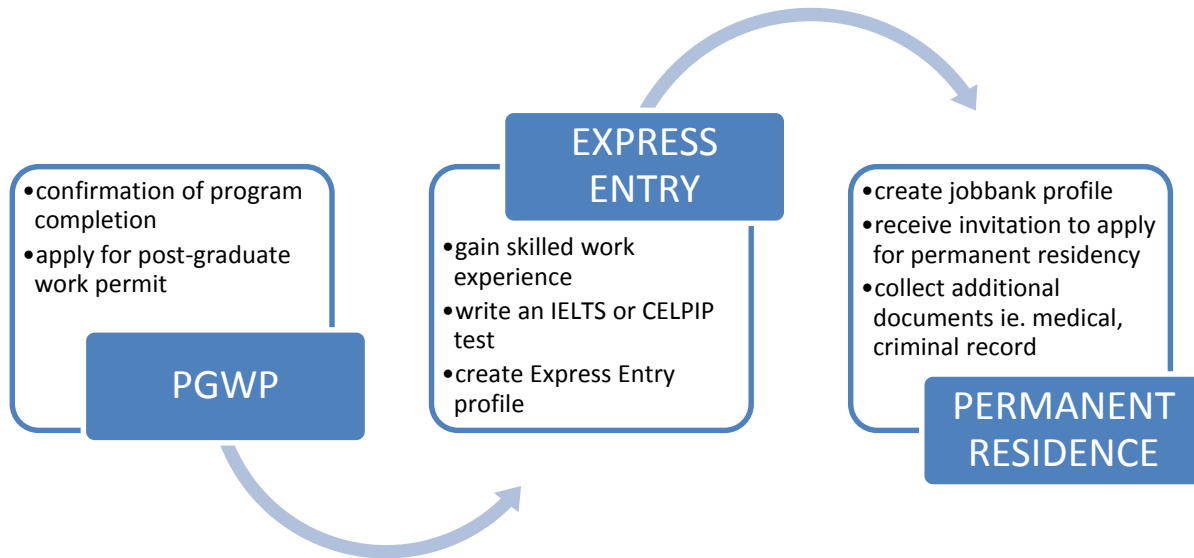


# Pathway to permanent residence in Canada

## For international graduates



### 1. Apply for your post-graduate work permit

You must apply for the Post-Graduate Work Permit within 90 days of receiving your final grades ie. if you see all of your final grades on April 25, you must apply before July 25. You must have a valid study permit when you apply. With a letter confirming your graduation from the Registrar's Office, you apply online through MyCIC. <http://www.cic.gc.ca/english/study/work-postgrad.asp>

Processing time for the PGWP is typically 4 weeks.

### 2. Gain 12 months of full-time, skilled work in Canada\*

For PR purposes, full time work is generally defined by IRCC as 30 hours a week (you need 1560 hours and this can be a combination of part-time jobs). What is "skilled" work? The National Occupational Classification (NOC) classifies jobs in Canada. Jobs classified as A, B, or 0 are generally considered "skilled" for which the skill level is based on the nature of education and training required. To determine the skill level of your job, search the NOC for the job title with "main duties" that most closely match your job's duties. You can then determine the job's skill level (e.g. A, B, C, D, or 0) within the NOC Matrix. See NOC Tutorial: <http://www5.hrsdc.gc.ca/NOC/English/NOC/2011/Tutorial.aspx>

### 3. Complete your express entry profile

Express Entry is an application management system used by Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada (IRCC) to manage certain economic PR programs. Express Entry applicants first (1) meet the requirements of a PR program managed through Express Entry, and then (2) create an online Express Entry profile. The system assesses each applicant's profile based on IRCC's Comprehensive Ranking System (CRS) and assigns a number of points to their application accordingly. After points are assigned, the application is placed in the Express Entry "pool." Only top ranked applicants are periodically "drawn" from the Express Entry pool and invited to apply for PR.

### 4. Once invited, apply for PR through Canadian Experience Program

Canadian Experience Class (CEC) CEC is a federal immigration program assessed through Express Entry. <http://www.cic.gc.ca/english/immigrate/cec/apply-who.asp>

To be eligible, you need 12 months of skilled work experience as described above.

Applications for PR are generally processed within 6 months.

### Nova Scotia Nominee Program

There are certain circumstances where you may also choose to apply for nomination through the province.

After completing your Express Entry profile, if you are worried you may not have enough points to be 'drawn' from the pool ie. less than 430, you can apply through the NS Experience program to receive an extra 600 points: <http://novascotiaimmigration.com/move-here/nova-scotia-experience-express-entry/>
